Western Australian Agricultural Colleges

- Western Australia has six agricultural colleges with commercial sized farms.
- Approximately 600 students across the college network complete a Certificate II in Agriculture and a range of other qualifications (including some at Certificate III level) by the time they complete Year 12. Other qualifications include Cropping, Production Horticulture, Sheep and Wool, Beef and Dairy Cattle, Pig and Poultry Production, Agro-Forestry and Equine, Engineering, Automotive, Building Construction and Furnishing, Occupational Health and Safety, First Aid, Vehicle and Machinery Operation and Farm Chemicals.
- All graduates are well prepared for employment and further training on farms and in agricultural supply chain businesses.



Traineeships

- A traineeship is an employment based training program generally made available at a Certificate I to IV level.
- A trainee can be employed directly as you would any member of staff or through a group training organisation.
- Trainees are paid a wage by their employer.
- In consultation with the employer a registered training organisation (RTO) delivers structured training and assessment to assist the employer to develop the skills of the trainee.
- Training generally consists of practical work done on the job and theory learning.
- Upon completion the trainee is issued a certificate for a nationally recognised qualification.
- Most full time agriculture traineeships run for approximately 12 months, after which the employer has the option of keeping the trainee on as an employee.
- Tuition fees are paid to the registered training organisation by either the trainee or the employer.
- Employers of trainees may be eligible for Australian Government incentive payments.
