Hon Mia Davies MLA
Leader of The Nationals WA

Mia was first elected to represent the Agricultural Region at the 2008 WA State election. At the 2013 State election, Mia successfully contested the seat of Central Wheatbelt for The Nationals WA. In November 2013 Mia made history when she became the first female party member to be appointed Deputy Leader of The Nationals WA. A month later she was appointed to Cabinet as Minister for Water; Forestry and in late 2014 added the Sport and Recreation portfolio to her Ministerial responsibilities. She has a particular interest in education and health and has been working to improve these services throughout the Wheatbelt region. Prior to entering Parliament, Mia worked as

a policy adviser for the Leader of the Parliamentary National Party, executive officer at the Chamber of Minerals and Energy and as a communications consultant. Mia holds a Bachelor of Marketing and the Media from Murdoch University. She is a member of the Northam Chamber of Commerce, Avon Tourism Board, Wheatbelt Business Network, Avon Community Development Foundation, Country Women's Association, Youth Advisory Council, Country Arts WA and the Royal Agricultural Society. Following the 2017 State election, Mia was elected Parliamentary Leader of The Nationals WA.

1. Richard Heath
General Manager Research,
Australian Farm Institute

Richard grew up on a family farm on the Liverpool Plains in north west NSW and he managed the cropping operations of the farm for nearly two decades. Crops grown included wheat, barley, chickpeas, faba beans, canola, sorghum, sunflowers, mung beans and cotton. Richard has been an early adopter of new farming technologies and travelled on a Nuffield Scholarship in 2003 researching precision applications of fertiliser. He has had extensive off-farm consulting roles including working with the Grains Research and Development Corporation advising on research

priorities for Australian grain growers. Richard is now the General Manager of Research for the Australian Farm Institute where he is responsible for carrying out research projects and compiling reports on a range of farm and agriculture-related issues. Prior to this role, Richard held an academic position with the University of Sydney as Associate Professor of Agronomy and Farm Management responsible for the management of the University's North West farms group. Richard also is a director of Nuffield Farming Scholars Australia.



2. Ruth Nettle
Associate Professor, University of Melbourne

Following an earlier career in agricultural extension, Ruth leads the Rural Innovation Research Group (RIRG) at the University of Melbourne in the Faculty of Veterinary and Agricultural Sciences. The group conducts research, development and teaching associated with the critical issues of innovation and change in agriculture and in rural communities and the management of human and natural resources. The work of the RIRG ensures people and social issues are viewed by industries and policy-makers as 'core business' to innovation through applying engaged research practices. Ruth supports agricultural industries and natural

resource management agencies design, implement and evaluate research, development and extension programs and was the national research leader for The People in Dairy program for Dairy Australia. Ruth's research work into the changing role of public and private sector extension and farming networks has attracted interest from many primary industries, culminating in a current project within the Federal Government's Rural R&D for Profit program regarding research into agricultural extension systems in Australia in collaboration with six rural industries and two State Governments.

3. Jan Paul Van Moort

Principal, ACIL Allen

Jan Paul leads ACIL Allen’s agribusiness section where he specialises in facilitating, developing and evaluating the strategies, collaborative structures and finance pools underpinning industry development. He has a deep understanding of both strategic and operational dimensions of primary industries, public policy, regional communities and associated challenges and opportunities based on 25 years of consulting and public sector experience.

Jan Paul has been integrally involved in developing the case for change requiring support and partnerships with multiple industry and government stakeholders from regional to national levels. Jan Paul works extensively with local groups to develop structures linked to national systems. This includes

scoping industry biosecurity funds, transferring irrigation schemes to community ownership, re-establishing cotton extension networks and creating a new dairy herd improvement service. He recently developed the successful Export Wine and Regional Support Package business case.

Last year he reviewed the 263 agricultural levies operating across Australia to support industry RD&E and biosecurity. Jan Paul also developed the Northern Beef Futures industry infrastructure plan and reviewed MLA. Jan Paul started his career as a development officer working on agricultural productivity, farm planning and natural resource management with farmer groups for the WA and NSW Governments.



4. Peter Cooke

Director, Agknowledge

Peter has had a range of roles from farmer to agribusiness consultant and policy contributor for Federal and State governments.

He began his career as a broadacre farmer in the Great Southern of WA in the 1970-80s, was the chief executive officer of the Kondinin Group in the 1980-90s. Since 1997, he has been an agribusiness consultant and director of Agknowledge, a small company providing management advice to a range of agribusiness companies and farming enterprises across Australia. Peter is a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors, and currently a board member of Landcorp and the Western Rock Lobster Council.

He has completed director roles for Landgate, the Rural Adjustment and Finance Corporation of WA and the International Institute for Agrifood Security, was the chairperson of the WA FarmBis program 1998-2008 and is the independent chair of four family farm boards. In 2016, Peter chaired the Ministerial Review Panel for the Future Directions Report for the Department of Agriculture and Food on WA.

In 2016, Agknowledge delivered agribusiness consultancy reports including the WA Wild Dog Action Plan, a skills analysis for the Grains Industry, a risk analysis for the Western Rock Lobster Industry, the agriculture background for the Broome Growth Plan and a business plan for Pardoo Beef Corporation.

1. Dr Steve Jefferies AM

Managing Director, Grains Research and Development Corporation

Dr Steve Jefferies has more than 32 years of experience working in the Australian grain industry mostly in research management. In July 2016 Steve commenced as Managing Director of the Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC). From its inception in 2002 until June 2016, Steve was the CEO of Australian Grain Technologies (AGT), Australia’s largest and market leading wheat breeding company. From 1996 to 2002 Steve was a wheat breeder, barley breeder and Senior Lecturer with the University of Adelaide. From 1984 to 1996 Steve held several positions in research management and Ministerial liaison in the State Government of South Australia. Until taking his current position as Managing Director GRDC

Steve was also Non-Executive Director of Birchip Cropping Group, Non-Executive Director of Barley Australia, Chairman of the Australian End Point Royalty Steering Committee, member of the Waite Institute Strategic Leadership Committee, and member of the Australian Wheat Quality Classification Council reporting to Wheat Quality Australia and responsible for managing the wheat quality class system in Australia.

In June of 2016 Steve was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia in the Queen’s birthday honours list for significant services to primary industries.



2. Ralph Addis

A/Director General, Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development

Ralph brings a wealth of experience from the private, not-for-profit and government sectors to his new role as the Acting Director General of Primary Industries and Regional Development. He has a natural affinity for regional WA having grown up on a farm at Cranbrook and spent much of his working life in Kununurra, where he worked across business and farming.

Ralph was the founding chief executive of the Wunan Foundation, an Aboriginal development body set up in the East Kimberley in 1997, and the chairman of the Kimberley Development Commission for more than two years, contributing to progressive strategies in housing, education, employment, and welfare reform.

In addition, Ralph has held a range of commercial, not-for-profit, and local government board positions. Since November 2014, Ralph has been the Director General at the Department of Regional Development where he has driven an outcome- based approach with a focus on jobs and economic growth.

Ralph’s immediate focus is delivering significant reform agendas to bring the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development in to operation from 1 July 2017. Ralph is a Chartered Accountant, holds a degree in Commerce, a Master of Agricultural Economics and is a graduate

Michael joined MLA in February 2009 to manage the Meat Standards Australia program. Michael is now General Manager Producer Consultation and Adoption and with this business unit is responsible for MSA, Genetics, Adoption and the Regional Consultation Model. Prior to joining Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA), Michael ran his own business marketing livestock, running beef processing for branded beef exporters and he held his own meat export license. Michael has held a range of commercial positions in the meat industry including livestock procurement, processing plant quality assurance, supply chain management and processing plant management. 4. Caroline Welsh

Chairperson, Birchip Cropping Group & Grain Farmer

Caroline is chairperson of the Birchip Cropping Group (BCG), a farmer led research and extension organisation in the Wimmera Mallee region of Victoria. BCG specialises in on-farm research trials, variety trials, risk management, precision agriculture, and crop forecasting and managing climate variability for cropping and livestock farmers.

Caroline is a partner in the family grain farm, a board member of GWMWater and has a degree in Agricultural Science and a Master of Marketing (Agribusiness). She worked in the Irrigated Horticulture Section of the Department of Primary Industries (Vic) for 19 years in the areas of industry development, export marketing, extension, irrigation and climate.

Caroline received a Churchill Fellowship in 1998 to investigate markets and competitors of Australia's fresh stone fruit exports.



5. Sue Middleton

Panel Moderator

Sue with her husband Michael manage a diversified farm in WA Wheatbelt growing grains, oaten hay and pork. They have also developed Moora Citrus, a 210 hectare citrus orchard in the new horticulture growing area near Dandaragan and through their businesses they employ over 30 fulltime staff.

As well as managing the finance, administration and human resources hub for the farming businesses, Sue manages a rural community development consultancy which provides facilitation, project development and planning services to regional communities and groups. Sue has been actively involved in many leadership roles across industry, leadership, agriculture and rural community development.

Current roles include board member of Landcorp and National Chair of the Landcare Advisory

Committee. Sue is passionate about the future of agriculture and the growth potential for the industry and the supply and value chains and has a clear vision for its development.

She has 'skin in the game' with investments across a number of agricultural sectors, and has a deep commitment to the growth of agriculture in Western Australia. For her work, Sue has been awarded the Centenary Medal for Service to Regional Australia in 2002 and was awarded the 2010 RIRDC Rural Woman of the Year for Australia and Western Australia.



6. Chris Reichstein

Mt Burdett Farming Company, Nuffield Scholar, Grower Group (SEPWA) & Grower Group Alliance Strategic Advisory Group Member

Chris is a member of the Grower Group Alliance of WA (GGA) Strategic Advisory Group as well as farming north east of Esperance. The farming operation comprises 4500 hectares of grain production in a cereal, pulse and oilseed rotation with an emphasis on best practice, productivity and sustainability.

Chris is passionate about the agriculture industry and the role of growers groups and has been an active executive member of South East Premium Wheat Growers Association (SEPWA) for many years.

Among numerous industry roles, Chris also undertook a Nuffield Scholarship in 2014 looking at how to extend the results of research to bring about practice change.

1. Cindy Cassidy

Chief Executive Officer, FarmLink

Cindy is currently chief executive officer of FarmLink, a not-for-profit farming systems group based in the Riverina in southern NSW. FarmLink undertakes RD&E activities to facilitate adoption of research outcomes on farm and in the farm businesses.

The group has eight staff, 800+ members representing 300 farm businesses over 1.2 million hectares of arable land. FarmLink has an annual turnover of \$800,000-\$1million and it also manages the Temora Agricultural Innovation Centre with an annual turnover around \$500,000.

Prior to FarmLink her career included roles as Executive Officer of Wheat Quality Australia and Industry Development and Technical Services Manager with AWBI (Australian Wheat Board).

Cindy has a degree in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology and a Master's Degree in Agriculture in Crop Breeding. She is also a Graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors (GAICD). In 2015 Cindy was named RIRDC NSW/ ACT Rural Woman of the Year and used the award, in part, to examine international approaches to agricultural extension with a view to understanding successful policy frameworks, investment strategies and practices which could inform activities implemented at a local level.

Cindy currently sits on the NSW Primary Industry Ministerial Advisory Committee and the Graham Centre Industry Advisory Panel



2. Liam O'Connell

General Manager WA Open for Business, Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development

Liam is passionate about supporting investment into Western Australian agribusinesses and food industries. With a background in agribusiness, Liam has more than 20 years commercial, trade and investment experience, both locally and internationally.

Before heading up the WA Open for Business office, Liam spent five years as EY's Western Australian Agribusiness Leader, managing a range of transaction and advisory projects.

For the five years prior to this, Liam set up and led KPMG Ireland's Commercial Due Diligence offering, which involved extensive experience in the agribusiness sector. Liam has worked on a variety of European Commission and World Bank funded

economic development projects and for 10 years worked with a consultancy linked to the Irish Trade Board and Shannon Development – a semi-state regional economic development agency – gaining extensive international trade and investment experience in emerging markets.

A member of various national agribusiness groups, Liam has published a series of trade/press articles and thought-leadership pieces in Australia and Ireland.

Liam is a Chartered Management Accountant and has business and economic qualifications from Harvard Business School and University College Cork (Ireland).



3. Brendan Nicholas

Esperance Manager Agriculture and Food, Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development

Brendan has 24 years experience in agriculture and natural resource management in research and management positions. He commenced with the Department of Agriculture in 1993 conducting soil survey and land capability projects in the Esperance region and subsequently moved into environmental reporting for the Recovery Catchment Projects for the Western Australian Salinity Action Plan. Brendan also participated in developing the first South Coast Regional Initiative Strategy for SCRIPT, now known as South Coast NRM.

He has since changed roles to the Esperance District Manager and became more involved with grower groups as a local point of contact for between DPIRD and local grower groups

such as SEPWA, RAIN and ASHEEP. As District Manager he is involved in incident/emergency management with local emergency manager committees (LEMAC) and involved in responses for the Esperance 2015 fires and the floods in 2017 around Ravensthorpe when grower groups featured as representatives of their members.

He continues to work with grower groups locally as well as an involvement in a number of grower group related DPIRD projects.

1. Mat Regan

General Manager - People Technology & Innovation Organisation, CBH Group

Mat Regan has worked with the CBH Group for 15 years leading teams in the Information Technology and Grain Quality Areas, where recently he led the implementation of Quality Optimisation and Supply Chain Optimisation.

Mat was appointed General Manager Corporate Services in 2014 where he is responsible for Information Technology and People and Performance. Innovation was added to this portfolio in 2017.

Nathan is a WA country boy from a family farm at Lake King and has been working in the Australian grains industry since graduating from university in 2006.



Project Manager – Extension Design,
Red Meat Profit Partnership (NZ)

Richard currently works within the Red Meat Profit Partnership as the Extension Design - Project Lead. This is an industry and crown funded collaboration of ten organisations aimed at improving the profitability of the New Zealand red meat sector. He leads a nationwide pilot involving 75 farms which are testing different extension approaches, in order to establish a national extension system for the red meat sector.

Formerly, he was the chief executive officer for New Zealand Young Farmers and the Primary Industry Capability Alliance, where he established a number of new capability development programs, such as AgriKids, TeenAg, Get Ahead, and the Rural Business Network.

John is also the founder and executive director of Living Farm Pty Ltd, a contract research company with operations based at York and Kununurra in WA. It services the grain growers in the Avon Valley and central Wheatbelt and provides contract R&D for grower groups across the state plus trials for crop protection, crop nutrition, soil health and plant breeding companies.

He is also a director of his family's broadacre grain and livestock farming company at Bruce Rock in the WA Wheatbelt. John is currently chairman and a founding director of NACRA, the Northern Australian Crop Research Alliance that conducts R&D into crop genetics, agronomics and irrigated cropping systems in Northern Australia.

John was the President of the Wickepin LCDC from 1993 to 2000 and was a key driver in its evolution into the Facey Group in 2001. John has a Bachelor of Business in Agriculture, a Diploma in Farm Management and a Graduate Degree in Marketing and Asian Business.

He is a Graduate of the Australian Rural Leadership Program and is a Nuffield Scholar.



3. Chris Souness

Chief Executive Officer, Birchip Cropping Group

Chris has spent 20 years in development and extension to drive innovation and research on the farm. Chris grew up on a family farm in WA, however he has worked in the Wimmera Mallee region of Victoria since 1992, firstly in private breeding canola research and then a long stint with Victoria's agricultural department. During this time he worked with farmers and their advisers to increase uptake of agricultural research particularly through building farmers knowledge and skills in agronomy and seasonal climate risk. In 2014 he joined the Birchip Cropping Group (BCG) as chief executive officer.

BCG is a not-for-profit agricultural research and extension organisation led by farmers from the Wimmera and Mallee regions of Victoria. Recognised both nationally and internationally by the industry as a credible independent and innovative organisation, BCG's

research and communication activities provide evidence, support and tools for improving farm management practices and profitability. BCG has been integral in the adoption of new agronomic technologies and farming practices and continues to help farmers make decisions, develop risk management strategies, increase profits and operate sustainable farming operations.

Chris is on the provisional board of the High Performing Soils CRC. He is an Advisory Member of the Farming Together Program, the Federal Government's Agricultural Competiveness White Paper on agricultural co-operatives. He is on the Mallee Sustainable Agricultural Strategy development supported by the Mallee CMA and on the steering committee of the Farming Smarter CRC.

1. Ruth Klingner

Executive Board Member, Central West Farming Systems (CWFS)

Ruth runs a mixed enterprise farming business in partnership with her mum, sister and brother with a total area of just over 2000 hectares. Their farms are located near Forbes and Cudal in New South Wales where they run Ridgehaven Poll Dorsets, one of Australia's largest Poll Dorset studs with around 1000 breeding ewes, a prime lamb enterprise, self-replacing commercial merino flock, Poll Hereford cattle herd and cropping enterprise, being mostly cereals and canola.

Western Australia's Premier's Fellow in Agriculture and Food, Curtin and Murdoch University & Food Agility CRC

Simon is the inaugural WA Premier's Fellow in Agriculture and Food at Curtin and Murdoch Universities.

His activities in digital agriculture go back to the 1990s, when he led the CSIRO Precision Agriculture Research Group which pioneered the development of precision agriculture and on-farm experimentation in Australia.
